# IB INTELLECT



I am very happy to provide a brief review of the International Baccalaureate Program, and begin by thanking the many John Adams' families and students who continue to embrace the educational opportunities provided by our school and corporation. As I look back at the past five years as the program coordinator at the school, I am excited about the endless possibilities that exist. Our students are better prepared than ever to face the future as they move on from high school to college life. I thank the parents of each student for their continued encouragement of their children, and their continued support of the teachers and administrators at our school. And without a doubt, my biggest thanks go to our teachers who invest their lives in teaching and

reaching out to our children.

For the past five years, the IB Program at Adams High School has shown unparalleled growth, and the numbers do not lie. From 12 IB Diploma Candidates in June 2011 to 35 this year; from a 46% Diploma graduation rate in 2011 to 74% graduation rate in 2015 (we won't know the results of this year's tests until July 5); the rise of IB Certificate recipients from 123 (2011) to 166 (2015); and the total number of test takers from 129 (2011) to 189 (2015).

This year, a total of 185 test takers registered for 494 tests. This includes the highest number of Diploma candidates ever at 35. A total of 84 Seniors will receive the IB Certificate, and when last year's 11 junior students who didn't take additional IB classes this year are added to the 2016 graduates, we have a senior class with a total of 130 students who

The IB Steering Committee has continued to develop and dialogue with teachers, parents, and the SBCSC administration. We are grateful to Dr. Jordan and will miss him. Three new members were added to the committee last fall, along with student representation. Thanks to all the committee members for their continued support and efforts. We especially thank senior students David Santiago and Paige Craig for their service to the committee.

Next fall, a total of 251 registered incoming Freshman Magnet students will be here. A total of 45 seniors will complete their TOK course next fall, and a total of 55 rising Juniors have signed up to take the TOK course in Spring 2017. TOK is again offered in Summer Session II which will enable some senior IB students to continue their Diploma studies with more flexibility. We anticipate great results with this year's graduating class, and look forward to a very positive review from the International Baccalaureate Organization as well. Have a great summer everyone!

### IB SELF-STUDY SURVEY RESULTS

A 54-question survey was sent to over 1000 e-mail addresses for current and former families and graduate students, and we share some of the findings from the 28 page report prepared by Kristi Donaldson (ABD Sociology) at the University of Notre Dame. The survey results were included in the 2016 Self-study that was submitted to IB at the end of May. The following Overall Assessment of the Program comes from the executive summary of the report.

"The majority of respondents agreed that JAHS provides adequate support for IB students; JAHS provides a climate and environment that supports the IB Program; the IB Program promotes the development of critical thinking skills; the IB Program provides students with opportunities to learn about issues with broader significance; as a college-preparatory program, the IB program places appropriate demands on students; and the program helps students become more competitive for admissions to selective universities or colleges.

Students and parents want more, ongoing information about IB Program requirements and expectations. Some requested more IB courses, especially HL courses. Finally, many respondents requested the coordination of deadlines across IB subject areas, and this coordination to also include the additional requirements of CAS, EE, and TOK."

Mr. Seitz and the IB Steering Committee are very thankful to Kristi Donaldson for the effort and quality of work that was done to produce the survey results. The information, findings, and recommendations will be shared with SBCSC administration, JA faculty, and will enable the program to continue to grow and develop as we move forward. # TWO IB DIPLOMA STUDENTS AWARDED TOP SCIENCE RECOGNITION ENTERING DUKE UNIVERSITY AND THE UNITED STATES NAVAL ACADEMY

Aidan Reilly's work focused on improving the efficiency of removing ground water pollution by a unique process called bioremediation. In brief, the process involves enhancing the oxidation processes in specific bacteria, which are found naturally in the soil, to remove soil water contaminants. Given the fact there are twelve Superfund sites within a fifteen-mile radius of John Adams High School, this was an especially timely topic. Aidan focused on this area of study for more than two years and expects to continue his work at the U.S. Naval Academy. Following the excitement of this experiment, he has indicated an interest in pursuing water studies as a career. Further, being an IB Diploma student, he also completed the investigation for his Extended Essay. In addition, Aidan received a research grant from AAAS, presented his findings at the Indiana University Medical Center and was two times selected state Champion of the Stockholm Junior Water Prize. Indiana Water Environment Association organized Aidan's selection and

provided the monetary funding for the trips. Aidan also conducted advanced genetics work at the University of Notre Dame.

Alicia Porile's work focused on possible effects of altered "g" forces on the behavior and regeneration of planarian flatworms. Alicia noted that gravity is a fundamental force that has been influencing all life since the beginnings of time. Ultracentrifuges and clinostats, as well as space shuttles, are used to study increased and decreased "g" forces. Her research organism, Planarian flatworms move by using cilia and twisting their muscle layer and the behavior of the worm can be assessed using a microscopic grid. In addition, planaria have the unique ability to regenerate cells, similar to stem cells, called neoblasts that exist within the worms. The purpose of this investigation was to determine the effect that greatly increased gravity would have on the behavior and regeneration of planarian flatworms. Two experimental groups, centrifuged at 7,000 g and 14,000 g for differing periods of time, were assessed along with the control. The regeneration of the planarian worms was assessed after being transversally cut post-centrifugation. Results showed that hypergravity detrimentally affected both the behavior and the regenerative capabilities of the planarian worms. Alicia anticipates further work in the sciences at Duke University. Alicia presented her work at IU Medical Center, Intel State Engineering Fair and was inducted as a Fellow in the American Junior Academy of Science in Washington, D.C. and had a research grant from AAAS.

Additional IB students receiving recognition for their exemplary science investigative work are Colin Lofy, Katherine Dyer, Joshua Isaacson and Sarah Henderson.


